
It seems we have something to add to the cultural conversation! I invite you to explore our work through this report.

Melbourne Season Concerts

The Melbourne season offered 13 performances, with 6 orchestral projects and one Australian Octet recital. The Orchestra made the difficult decision to move some Thursday evening performances from Federation Square after the brochure was printed, to guarantee performances would not be interrupted by external noise. As a result, the Thursday performances were spread across Melbourne Recital Centre, Hawthorn Arts Centre and Iwaki Auditorium. Attendances at HAC and Iwaki were similar to what we would have expected at Federation Square.

Leading artists including Andrew Haveron, David Fung, Diana Doherty, Alexandre Oguey, Prudence Davis, Alice Giles and Stefan Cassomenos collaborated with the orchestra as soloists. 2019 saw the beginning of a partnership with choir Polyphonic Voices, under the directorship of Michael Fulcher, for MCO's first performances with choir.

Commissions and premieres included Yackandandah Music by Nicholas Buc (supported by the Robert Salzer Foundation) and the Victorian premiere of composer Joe Chindamo's Sanctuary for oboe, cor anglais and string orchestra.

Salon Sessions

Aiming to create "unforgettable close encounters with chamber music" the Salon Sessions were an innovative concept pairing fine wine and canapés with a performance of chamber music masterworks. The Salon Sessions were presented in the Primrose Potter Salon at Melbourne Recital Centre. In 2019, the two performances utilised the Melbourne Chamber Orchestra Quartet (with guest Matthew Laing) to perform string quartets by Haydn & Smetana, and string quintets by Mozart & Brahms.



Touring

Melbourne Chamber Orchestra continues its strong commitment to regional audiences. In 2019, the orchestra toured all season programs apart from *Jovian Worlds* as well as both Salon Sessions programs. The Orchestra's touring work also includes its five-event weekend festival in Daylesford; education performances and preconcert talks.

The orchestra's touring work was funded by Touring Victoria and assisted by Regional Arts Victoria.

Education

For the second year, MCO's Encounter the Orchestra events provided primary students (Grades 3–6) in regional areas with a live encounter with Melbourne Chamber Orchestra. The structured, narrated events included performances, interaction, explanations, demonstrations and an opportunity for students to sing accompanied by the orchestra.

We served over 1000 students for the first time, in performances in Portland, Yackandandah and Traralgon.

Our Encounter the Orchestra initiative was supported by the Strategic Partnerships Program of the Department of Education and the Gwen & Edna Jones Foundation.

The orchestra also presented a group class in Mornington with William Hennessy.



A Feast of Music

Melbourne Chamber Orchestra's annual chamber music festival, A Feast of Music, brings five chamber music events into Victoria's leading regional tourism destination, including an orchestral concert at the Daylesford Town Hall and a chamber music dinner at Lake House.

Guest musicians in 2019 included Elizabeth Layton, Prudence Davis, Alice Giles AM, and Lucinda Collins.
